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

SR NOELENE QUINANE RSJ AWARD FOR ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE


CLAUDIA HOLLAND



has been a year of progress for the 2014 has been a year or progress for the College, achievement for the teachers and students, and one of considerable affirmation for the St Mary MacKillop College community.

The Class of 2014 was farewelled with deep emotion and thanksgiving at their Final Assembly, Graduation Mass, and Graduation Formal. They have been a year group that has reflected a good deal of what we love about our leaders at MacKillop. A good-humoured bunch, they developed relationships with their teachers and with each other that were respectful, appropriate, and life giving. Frequently seen at the junior campus adopting classes, helping with Homework Club, and mentoring students, they reflected the values of collective responsibility, service, hard work, and a desire to make a difference.

The faith life of the College continued to reflect the

growing maturity and confidence of MacKillop. Our liturgies, Masses, community prayer, and the outward symbols of our Catholic Faith and traditions were strengthened in dignity, engagement, and recognition that these are the things that bind us as a faithful community and that lead us to encounters with Jesus.

Although the College saw an increase in the number of Catholic families choosing MacKillop, the Josephite emphasis on inclusion and diversity saw the College find new ways to respect the faith life of others in our school, and to respectfully integrate their beliefs and observances into our community. This remains an enthusiastic endeavour of the College.

The students continued to build upon their achievements in the classroom, in sport, and in the arts. Improving NAPLAN results are, of course, a point of reference with MacKillop students achieving beyond

expected growth and outperforming "like schools" around the country. Individual student achievement highlighted the successful partnerships the College enjoyed with our universities, local sports clubs, the cultural institutions around Canberra and with parishes, local schools, and our neighbours.

The staff continued to build upon their talents. capabilities, and skills. Eighteen coordinators had successful reviews of their performance, including the Assistant Principal Curriculum, Mrs Michelle da Roza, and the two Campus Heads, Ms Sandra Darley and Mr Paul O'Callaghan. Eight new early career teachers benefited from our Early Career Mentoring Program and several Faculty Heads implemented new programs in literacy, numeracy, and sustainability, whilst the implementation of the Australian Curriculum was consolidated.

Excitingly, several staff completed higher degrees and Mrs Prathiba Nagabhushan will be entitled to be called 'Doctor,' having completed her PhD in Psychology from ANU this year.

The College received over 480 applications from families wanting to enroll their child into Year 7 at MacKillop for 2015. So great was the demand that the College sought, and was granted, an extra class for 2015. This is a considerable vindication of the regard this part of Canberra and part of NSW hold the College. It was such a shame to have to develop such a long waiting list and disappoint so many people.

2015 will be a year of building and refurbishment, considerable strategic planning for beyond, and programs to integrate our new students (over 400 of them) and staff into College life.

The high regard the College enjoys in our community is in no small way a result of the confident trust and engagement between our families and MacKillop. I would like to take this opportunity to express my thanks to everybody connected with MacKillop for your support, loyalty, and advocacy on behalf of the College.

SMMC: Emma, the role of Faith and **Community Captain is one of the busiest** at the school. What kinds of things did you have to do this year?

PORTFOLIOS/SUSTAINABILITY

SMMC: Ben, what kinds of things did you have to do this year in your role as Sustainability Captain?

BC: My first project was to finish off the program with the new bins, which included having to inform the campus of the exact items that go in each bin. The SRC made a fun informational video, which was supported by Mr Smith's video on rubbish.



STUDENTS WIN ACT TEEN CHEFS COMPETITION •

ACKILLOP STUDENTS won a competition? That's nothing new. But when a team of Year 9 girls took out first place in the ACT Teen Chefs Competition, it was the calibre of their opponents that made their victory quite an incredible feat.

MacKillop's 'Team Supreme', consisting of Amberley Elliott, Claire Lonie, Brooke

Simpson, and Katelyn Twiss, won the final 'cook-off' of the competition against Daramalan and Narrabundah colleges

process, Team Supreme went through to the finals at the Belconnen Fresh Food Markets on 27 August, where they had to create three original dishes and recreate the 'MasterClass dish' - a nashi pear and frangipane tart - as taught by mentor chef Ivonne Nathan.

The difference in age and experience did not matter, however, as a panel of chefs judged Team Supreme to have created the best original dish as well as the mostaccurate representation of the MasterClass dish.

The team was elated with their victory but was also quick to thank their Food teacher, Mr Justin Kain, for the part he played.

Each dish had to contain thyme, nashi pear, and cavolo nero, which were the mandatory ingredients.

By taking out the competition, the girls won MacKillop a cash prize, the Teen Chefs trophy, a collection of cookbooks, and four tablets. The greatest prize, however, was the experience.

"We gained a lot of skills from this," they said.

"We learnt so many little tips and tricks, as well as how to work cleanly and manage our time. The experience also brought us together, so now we'll always be 'Team Supreme'."

















SENIOR STUDENT NABS SCHOLARSHIP FOR SINGAPORE SCIENCE CAMP •

HO BETTER TO represent Australia at the 8th Asian Science Camp than a student who studies FOUR different Science subjects?

That must have been the thought process of Charles Darwin University, who awarded Tyler Jones of Year 12 one of two indigenous science scholarships to attend the six-day camp at Nanyang Technical University in Singapore in late August.

Tyler, who studies Physics, Chemistry, Earth Science, and Astronomy, was encouraged to apply for the scholarship by his teacher, Mr Mike Brennan.

"When I heard about the opportunity to apply, I thought straight away that Tyler is the kind of guy who needs to go for this," Mr Brennan said.

"We're very, very proud of him."

Australia sent a delegation of nine students from across the country as selected by Australian Science Innovations, which runs the national Big Science Competition and Australian Science Olympiad program.











SMMC: Tyler, congratulations on your selection to go over to Singapore for the Asian Science Camp! How did it feel to be selected?

TJ: At first I was in shock, I originally thought that it was a joke but then it was confirmed and I was ecstatic and I thought that it was such an honour to be selected.

SMMC: What was the experience like? What sorts of things did you do?

TJ: I have to admit the weather in Singapore was hot and muggy, but the trip and the conference were just mind-blowing. We got to see a lot of the big sights around Singapore like Gardens by the Bay and Orchard Road. We also got to meet with the Nobel laureates who were there and had a few things signed and questions answered.

SMMC: What are some of the things you learnt during the camp?

TJ: I learnt which fields science was focusing on, new concepts, and areas of Science like crystallography and its applications. I learnt about the position that modern Science was in as well as the evolution of Science through time and the projections of Science and its purpose. I also met a lot of smart people and learnt that a career in Science will not be an easy pursuit, for there is strong competition.

SMMC: You take a number of Science subjects at MacKillop. Which is your favourite and why?


TJ: Physics is my favourite Science because there are so many important things to understand like quantum mechanics and nuclear physics, which is always interesting.

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MACKILLOP FAMILY GROWS WITH COOMA EXPANSION





Years 11 and 12. What were your main

reasons for choosing MacKillop?

EH: St Pat's only caters up until Year 10. Many of us didn't want to go off to a boarding school, and the only other option was a local bus to Canberra that leaves at 6am. MacKillop came to us while we were in Year 10 at St Pat's and presented us with an opportunity to continue our Catholic education with MacKillop through St Pat's. We had interviews and orientations and a number of the St Pat's year group were interested in the wider range of subjects and opportunities MacKillop offered. Through St Pat's we went through an enrolment process and kept in touch while we finished Year 10 to prepare for this new chapter of our lives.

SMMC: What were your first impressions of the school and how has the rest of the year been?

EH: At first we were all very nervous.

We had had a few orientations, but
we were nervous that we wouldn't
know our way around, and at first look
MacKillop was a lot bigger. We were
also nervous about getting used to



F YOU'VE SEEN A FEW NEW faces at the Isabella Campus in 2014, that's because MacKillop welcomed 23 new students into Year 11 this year through the forging of a new relationship with St Patrick's school in Cooma.

Because St Pat's only goes up to Year 10, and there are no Catholic colleges in Cooma, MacKillop stepped in to provide a Catholic pathway for St Pat's students,

arranging a bus to bring them to the Isabella Campus each day.

The size of that bus is set to grow in 2015, with an additional 20 Cooma students expected to join MacKillop for Year 11 2015.

We caught up with Cooma student *Emma Holgate* to hear about her first impressions of MacKillop and the experience of being a MacKillop student in

so many new people after being with the same small group for so long. Throughout the year things have just gotten easier and easier. We are all very comfortable in the MacKillop community and we're excited to see future St Pat's groups come through.

SMMC: How is MacKillop different to St Pat's?

EH: St Pat's is definitely a lot smaller. Last year, I was in a year group of 30 students, and going from that to around 300 was a big change. It was weird going from a school where you knew the names of every student from Year 7-10 to meeting someone new in your grade everyday, even still at the end of the year.

SMMC: How do you deal with the long bus rides? Is it difficult if you need to stay back at school or in Canberra for some reason?

EH: The bus ride is just over an hour. This means we leave Centennial Park at 7:30am and are back by 4:30pm, which isn't too bad. The bus trips give us a time to catch up, sleep or even do assignments if we need to. Staying in Canberra for after-school activities or for early morning excursions isn't too difficult. Most of us have made good

friends we can stay with, and our parents are often willing to take turns to carpool us to and from events.

SMMC: Being so close with the other Cooma students, has it been difficult to branch out and make friends with the students who have been at MacKillop for a while?

EH: We all made friends pretty much instantly. When we got put into our PCs we had at least one other Cooma student with us, but we made friends with others straight away. Everyone was really welcoming and friendly. We still had our Cooma friendships while we were figuring everything out, but now we have friends all over the place as well as our previous friendships which have become even stronger.

SMMC: How have you found the ACT system compared with NSW?

EH: The ACT system is a lot more relaxed. We don't have the pressure of a final HSC exam determining our entire senior schooling. The AST test is based more around general knowledge, and our knowledge on our subjects is assessed over two years rather than just the final exam. I've found it to be more manageable and it has helped me to balance everything.

years since becoming a student at MacKillop, Matt Egan is finally leaving. In Matt's final year as a student in 2010, the former MacTechies member was identified as a potential staff member on MacKillop's IT team. Just four weeks after graduating, Matt began his first day as a MacKillop staff member. We caught up with the man whose life, from the end of this year, will finally be away from the realm of St Mary MacKillop College.

SMMC: It's rare (but not unheard of) that students take up a position on the MacKillop staff immediately after graduating. What was it like to begin working here so soon after ending up as a student?

ME: Exciting, It was a fantastic experience to work with the staff. It took a bit of time to stop calling everyone Sir and Miss, but the hardest part was seeing the students that were in the year below me (and some in the same classes as me) and having to have such drastically different interactions with them.

SMMC: What are some of your fondest memories at MacKillop? As a student or a staff member? Do you have an example of something you will always remember about this place?

ME: I will never forget the day that I graduated. Being at the Formal, getting our certificates and knowing that we had done it. Everyone looked so confident and happy. It made me very proud. Other than that it will always be the atmosphere that I

remember, going from class to class, being with my friends the entire time. Then having my IT team to work with, our day to day conversations made it great to come to work each day.

SMMC: What made you decide to join the staff?

ME: To be honest: money. It was also a job that I felt that I would be okay at, and I really wanted to move on from my job at McDonald's.

SMMC: Is there anything you learned about MacKillop by being on staff that you never would have known as a student?

ME: Teachers are way cooler than anyone ever guessed as a student. They are really good at having an awesome time...when students aren't looking

SMMC: What are your plans now that you have decided to leave MacKillop?

ME: I plan to go to university, study and get good grades. I might do some travel too, at the least go around Australia. And maybe I'll come back and visit from time to time and see how you are all surviving without me.

SMMC: You're fairly famous around here for being a clean-freak. How do you think the IT team will cope without you?

ME: Ha, let's just say, they are going to misplace so much stuff. If you can't find the IT staff, just shout into the piles of junk in their office, they may have gotten trapped.

SMMC: Are there any words of wisdom you feel you can share with students or staff

ME: Make the most of your time at Mackillop, it's a fantastic place to be, but it only happens once in a lifetime.


