ADMINISTRATION OF MEDICATION/HEALTH CARE PLANS

Parents are reminded that students who require medication to be dispensed during school hours must have a Request to Dispense Medicine form completed and returned to the College. Forms are available from Student Reception at both campuses. Please note that without the signed form, staff will not be able to dispense medication to your son or daughter. Parents are required to complete an Individual Health and Emergency Care Plan for any student:

1. Diagnosed with severe asthma, type 1 diabetes, epilepsy or anaphylaxis;
2. diagnosed as being at risk of an emergency;
3. who requires the administration of a health care procedure.

Individual Health and emergency Care Plans are available from Student Reception at both campuses. Please note that it is the responsibility of parents/carers to ensure that all plans are current.

Numeracy

In recognition that numeracy skills are essential to everyday life, the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) has incorporated Numeracy as one of seven General Capabilities underpinning the Australian Curriculum. For students to become numerate, they need opportunities to use their mathematical knowledge and skills outside of the Mathematics Classroom. To facilitate this, the Wanniasa Campus engaged in a Kahoot! Competition during National Literacy and Numeracy Week (29 August - 4 September). For those unfamiliar with Kahoot!, it is an online gaming platform incorporating quiz-like questions. The teacher displays the quiz to a class and students answer the multiple-choice questions on their own devices. The quiz questions can be illustrated by colourful pictures and animations and are backed by catchy music. Students often find themselves dancing along. During NLNW, Kahoot!s reflected both a Literacy and Numeracy focus, with cross-curriculum questions.

- *Red and blue are mixed in the ratio 3:7 to make a particular shade of purple. How much red and blue paint are needed to make 20L of this shade of purple?*
- *How can 2 1/2 cups of flour be measured if you only have access to a 1/4 cup measure?*

The Pastoral Care Class that achieved the highest average points over NLNW was 9A2. They were treated to a pizza lunch for their efforts and success.

There was a high level of engagement with these Kahoot!s over NLNW, particularly with the added incentive of a prize. Wishing to capitalise on such student engagement, Pastoral Care Teachers have continued delivering Numeracy Kahoot!s on the Wanniasa Campus, once a week during Term 4. These are proving very successful, not only in engaging students in numeracy on a regular basis, outside of the Mathematics classroom, but the collaboration and competition is assisting in strengthening a community environment within Pastoral Care Classes.

School Shoes

In preparation for the 2017 school year, many students may be in a position of needing to purchase new school shoes. The policy regarding school shoes is outlined on the College website and in the Student Diary and states the expectation being:

- traditional, black, leather, lace up, polishable school shoes.
- Suede shoes and black joggers are not acceptable for safety reasons.
- Elevated shoes and platform heels are not a part of the College uniform. The sole should be no more than 2 cm high and the heel 3 cm.

Teen Start-Up: First Responders is an innovation camp for 12 to 18 year olds, run during the January school holidays. Over three days, students are taken through the innovation development process from idea to execution. Students form teams, work with mentors, hear from industry experts and come up with an idea for a business or social enterprise and then pitch their concept to a panel of judges. The theme for this competition is 'First Responders'. Teams will be looking at problems encountered by our first responders in managing emergency situations - the police, paramedics, State Emergency Services, army, public health departments, HAZMAT teams, hospital emergency departments and the fire brigade. They will be challenged to come up with innovative solutions to predicting, managing and avoiding emergency situations.

School Shoes

In terms of footwear, the expectation is traditional, black, leather, lace up, polishable school shoes. Suede shoes and black joggers are not acceptable for safety reasons. Elevated shoes and platform heels are not a part of the College uniform. The sole should be no more than 2 cm high and the heel 3 cm. Buckle shoes, canvas shoes, ballet shoes, cloth shoes, and slip on shoes are NOT permitted.



Shoes which do not meet the College criteria:

- do not cover all of the upper foot
- are not polishable
- do not have a heel
- have a thin sole
- are not robust enough to protect the top of the foot



Traditional school shoes are leather, have a heel, a sturdy upper and a sole of sufficient density to ensure safety in the differing learning areas where students work.

Building parent-school partnerships

7 ways to help you be on top of your parenting game

Effective parents equip their children with the skills, know-how and values they need to stay safe and be successful. These seven ideas will help make sure your parenting reflects the times in which we live.

Everyone wants to be the best parent they can be, yet it can be confusing knowing just what to focus on. Here are seven ideas that reflect current trends and needs and will help you be on top of your parenting game:

1 Give the gift of restraint

At a time when kids receive so much it's easy to forget that restraint is a virtue. Just because you can afford to give children and young people what they want, doesn't mean you should. Differentiate between a want and a need, and encourage restraint, goal setting and saving.

2 Build your developmental knowledge

Lucky you have two eyes, as you need to keep one parenting eye on meeting kids' current needs and the other on preparing them for the next stage of development. If starting or leaving secondary school is a year away then start thinking now about how you can make sure your child or young person is ready for the next phase of their life.

3 Reinforce self-regulation

"You waited your turn! Great stuff!"

"Thanks for packing away the toys without being told." "Good on you for staying in bed when you

woke up rather than coming to our bedroom and waking us up."

A child's ability to self-regulate behaviour (like the ability to self-soothe and self-occupy) is highly underrated, and doesn't come naturally to all kids. That's where consistent parenting using visual management and behavioural consequences comes in.

4 Practise digital parenting

The most tech-savvy generation ever raised needs digitally-aware parents. The internet is fun and it's here to stay, but it can pose risks for some kids. Digital parenting means providing guidelines for safety without limiting children's opportunity to learn and communicate in the online world. It also requires you to understand the digital world that your kids inhabit.

5 Develop character strengths in kids

Recent studies (most notably the work of US-based Angela Duckworth) have found that character, not cognitive ability, is the single most reliable determinant of how a person's life will turn out. The traits associated with success include the inclination to persist at boring

or difficult tasks (**grit**), the ability to delay gratification (**self-control**) and the ability to follow through with a plan (**conscientiousness**).

6 Practise reciprocity

The best families, like the most meaningful communities, are built around the principle of reciprocity. *"We help each other out and we treat each other fairly"* builds belonging and forges greater kinship between siblings. Start by getting kids of all ages to help out at home without being paid.

7 Encourage social risktaking

One in three children are risk-adverse when it comes to meeting new people and entering new social situations. Social media removes risk for these kids, yet it's not the answer. Use a variety of strategies ranging from **scaffolding** (baby steps), **practising** meeting and speaking to new friends and **modelling** social risk taking yourself to encourage kids to continually refresh their social networks.

Pick one or two of these ideas, or your own parenting idea, to focus on over a month. Once you've mastered one idea then move on to another, so that you are constantly improving and being up-to-date as a parent.
