MOBILE PHONE PROCEDURES AT THE PADUA CAMPUS

The College policy on mobile phones at the Padua Campus is that no students are to use mobile phones at school, from their time of arrival until 3.15pm.

If mobile phones are sighted by staff, they are confiscated and stored securely at the front office. They may be collected at the end of the school day on the first or second occasion. In these situations, an email will be sent to parents informing them of the incident. If a student's phone or mobile device is confiscated on a third, or further occasions in a year, parents will be contacted by a Pastoral Care Coordinator. The phone will remain secured at the Front Office and will either be:

- stored at the College until it is collected by a parent, OR
- returned to the student once an after school detention has been agreed to and scheduled.

If there is a pressing issue requiring a student to use a phone they may do so at Student Reception or their Pastoral Care Coordinator's Office. Parents may also get in contact with their son or daughter during the school day by contacting Student Reception

All students have been reminded of the policy and procedures at recent Year Assemblies and at the Campus Assembly this week. The options available to students, should they need to use their phone or other mobile devices for a valid reason, have been reiterated.

Your phone is a great tool but it can also hurt your performance unless it is managed

- Students who perform a task just in sight of their phone (regardless of if they are using it) do about 20% worse as it still distracts them
- Phone use every day for longer than 20 minutes at a time leads to poor sleep quality and duration
- Being on your phone within an hour before bed means that you are almost three times as likely to get less than five hours sleep
- Students who are on their phone more get worse grades, regardless of gender or previous grade average

YEAR 11 AND 12 MENINGOCOCCAL IMMUNISATIONS

Last week the ACT Schools Health Team visited MacKillop to offer the free Meningococcal ACWY vaccine to all Year 11 and 12 students. 76% of students took up the opportunity to be vaccinated.

For any Year 11 and 12 students missed the opportunity, they can still receive the free vaccine by phoning the Community Health Intake line on 6207 9977, and booking into one of the Meningococcal ACWY Immunisation Catch Up Clinics being offered at the City Health Centre in October and December 2018.

YEAR 11 HOSPITALITY EXCURSION SYDNEY 23 + 24 AUGUST 2018

Year 11 Hospitality students were fortunate to participate in an excursion to Sydney on Thursday 23 and Friday 24 August to investigate various aspects of the hospitality industry. We met at the Isabella Plains Campus bright and early at 4.45am to board the bus to Sydney. We began with a tour at Sydney Tower. After a short talk about Sydney Tower and its hospitality operations, students were taken on a tour through the commercial kitchens on the ground floor. The Head Chef was able to explain the duties and roles he has responsibility to oversee and I am very proud to say that our students were able to answer all the food hygiene questions which were directed at them. Students were given a tour of the 360° Bar and Dining restaurant which has the capacity to seat 140 people per session. Students were then able to enjoy a buffet lunch in the revolving restaurant while taking in the views of Sydney.

David Jones Food Hall was the next destination and was quite an experience with students finding various seafood varieties at extremely high prices and some in-season produce. After a short walk to the Queen Victoria Building and down George Street along the edge of Chinatown we checked into the YHA for a welcome rest. Darling Harbour provided an excellent venue for dinner in the evening with a wide variety of foods to eat.


Day 2 saw the students up early again at 5.00 am to partake in a quick breakfast before travelling to the Sydney Fish Markets for a guided tour at 6.30 am. The SFM is the largest market of its kind in the southern hemisphere. There were many unique and unusual species of fish, crustaceans and shellfish from across Australia and New Zealand. (Unfortunately no photography was allowed on the floor). Our tour guide, whom the students nicknamed "Jack Black", was full of information about the seafood industry, particularly sustainable fishing and how we should value the life of fish we eat.

The next stop was a visit to The Rocks to experience the Friday Foodie Markets where a wide variety of multicultural and local foods were available. Choices included Italian dessert pizza, Turkish gozleme, Australian kangaroo and crocodile skewers, local hand-made chocolate, olive oil and vinegars and fresh bread and confectionary. Splendid views of the harbour were taken in as students strolled around the iconic area while trying not to get wet.

The two days concluded with a Korean BBQ lunch, where students were able to cook their own meat on an open grill as they sat at their tables. Kimchi was popular with those who liked chilli as were the marinated meats, sauces and sides called banchan. A cultural tour of Chinatown finished the afternoon but it's not a visit to Chinatown without purchasing "Emperor Puffs" - a delightful morsel of pastry and custard, a perfect way to finish.

The Year 11 Hospitality students proudly represented our school with great pride and have shown a keen interest in the industry and all it has to offer.

FAITH LIFE

BREAKING IT DOWN TO A SINGLE TERM

As the College draws closer to the biggest day it celebrates together on the calendar, it seems natural to contemplate a reflection on the life and legacy of St Mary MacKillop. Yet as I pondered, my fear of repetition grew since I had already written thoughts on this for the newsletter around the time of our pilgrimage to Eden and the actual feast day of 8 August. Surely there aren't enough words to encapsulate the charism of St Mary MacKillop?! Perhaps, but articulation through words instead of a visceral reaction in our hearts can risk rendering them redundant or contrived. Nothing was coming to me.

It's funny how moments can hit you as both a visceral response and an amalgam of words, both written and from others, and washes over you all at once while your meagre mind hopes it can capture its essential nature. Such times happen here or there in my love/hate relationship with being a drive away from work. One of these moments came the other evening as I drove home from a presentation by our principal Michael Lee to the potential captains of 2019. In the presentation, he spoke to the students about our College vision, telling them "that's it, that's who we are..." That is who we are.

Contemplation on the presentation suddenly flashed in my mind numerous experiences at school or at Mass or from words of Scripture, which then paradoxically started to recede to such simplicity as to come down to one thing. I recalled a homily which spoke "creed, code and cult"; to put basically "what we believe, how we live and who we are". Taking away the broader 'village' of our Church and looking at the little 'hamlet' we have at St Mary MacKillop College, it occurred to me that our College vision is all three of the above "Cs" from the perspective of a school.

While I encourage anyone to look at and further consider our entire College vision, I stopped short after our first line: "We are a dynamic, welcoming community based on the Gospel values of Faith, Hope and Love". A further wave of thoughts washed over me as a homily from another priest who said "strip away all that other noise and nonsense, and get down to what it's all about...love". St Paul gave us the above theological virtues in Corinthians and then reinforces "the greatest of these is love" (1 Cor 13:13), or "God is love; let us love one another, for love is from God" from 1 John 4:7.

As I have previously written, saints like those of Mary MacKillop are merely conduits to an encounter with Christ who leads us to the loving arms of God. To draw on the concept of "providence", whose Latin roots mean "to attend to", Mary MacKillop attended to those in need, Christ instructed us to attend to each other, and God attends to us. God's providence is the deepest expression of love, how we attend to each other is that outward sign of love.

What an oversight, what a search for words which ends so simply in a single term which carries both word and a visceral response in the heart: love. On our special day at St Mary MacKillop College, "May the spirit of unity and love reign amongst us" (1874)

St Mary of the Cross MacKillop, pray for us.

Kids need good men in their lives

While rummaging through my bookshelves at home recently I stumbled across *Romulus, My Father* by Raimond Gaita, a book that had a huge impact on me as a father.

Romulus, My Father is a lovingly told memoir of a hard-working father who remained faithful to his family and friends despite his wife's affairs, her mental illness and dealing with the hardships of earning a living in 1950s and '60s rural Australia. It's a tale of love, friendship and character.

One line in the book, *"I know what a good man is because I saw it in my father,"* struck an instant chord with me. It was a reminder that kids need to have close experiences with men who have real depth of character and strength if they are to adopt those qualities themselves and also look for them in partners.

Role models of quality

Sadly, children and young people are less likely to see these qualities in many of our current political leaders and other public figures. Self-interest and shallowness of character, at least in a public sense, seems to be standard fare at present.

Like Gaita, I had the good fortune to have a father who was also a good man. He wasn't wealthy, famous or ambitious. Rather he was kind, considerate and generous. He had experienced an unhappy and – I suspect though he never spoke of it – abusive childhood but he was determined that his children would never experience the same treatment that he received.

As a disciplinarian he was soft but that didn't mean he was a pushover. He'd stand his ground with his children over issues that really mattered, such as how we siblings treated each other, displays of dishonesty and disrespect, and taking shortcuts in our studies or with work. He was a community-minded man who, through his example, taught his children the importance of serving and giving to those who didn't have the same serving of luck that we did. He was also an involved father who, despite being busy, always had time to play cricket and football after work with my brother and me. He was never too busy for his children.

A compass and a map

Significantly, my father gave me my moral compass in the form of the value system that he lived by. His many sayings including his most popular mantra: "If you can't say a good word about anyone don't say anything at all". That still rattles around in my head today. Through his active community involvement, his devotion to family and

his propensity to have a good laugh, he gave me a map to follow on how to live a good life.

I don't have a monopoly on being raised by a good man. If you were raised by a good man then count your blessings because you had a wonderful head start in life. Your task is to make sure your father's legacy lives on in your own children. You'll do that by being a man of strength and character, and by being a wise, loving presence in your children's lives whatever their age.

If, through whatever circumstance, you didn't have a good man close to you in your life as a child, then start the process with your own kids. Many men who have gone before you weren't close to their own fathers, or had fathers who were ineffectual, but they became great fathers despite their circumstances.

With public life increasingly producing male role models of dubious quality, it's up to dads and other significant males in the lives of children and young people to be good men, strong men and men of honour.

That's the legacy that we leave.
