Dear Parents, Teachers and Students,

The College's Principal's blessing over Year 12 - Farewell Assembly 2020

"When President elect Joe Biden stayed with his grandparents as a little boy, he would leave the house to go to school each morning. His granddaddy told him as he was leaving, "Hey Joey, keep the faith." His grandmoither would call out, "No, Joey, don't keep it to yourself - spread the faith."

1 Thessalonians 5:13-22 tells us how to spread the faith:

Go forth into the world in peace; be of good courage; hold fast that which is good; redner to no one evil for evil; strengthen the fainthearted; support the weak; help the afflicted; honour everyone; love and serve the Lord, rejoicing in the power of the Holy Spirit; and the blessing of God almighty, the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit, be among you and remain with you always. Amen."

YEAR 12 FAREWELL ASSEMBLY

Last week, Year 12 were farewelled at a breakfast provided by the staff, followed by their own assembly. A variety of awards were given by students to their peers (highly entertaining) and a number of theatrical and performing arts items by the students were presented at their assembly (even more entertaining!). At the end of the assembly, I made some remarks to the Graduating Class, read them Dr Seuss' Oh The Places You'll Go, and presented them with a copy each as they left school for the last time.

In my remarks, I shared with them the idea of going your own way, marching to the beat of your own drum, and having the courage and conviction to live by your own principles and values - and how irresistible that can be to others. Students at this school are encouraged to be themselves and to view their actions critically in light of the gospel framework - how do my actions best reflect faith, hope, and love?

The unprecedented pandemic and its attendant trials has meant that their final year of high school has been very different. Their courage, fortitude, understanding, and good humour says everything about their parenting, their school, and the young women and men they have become. Few are better prepared to make a contribution to their wider world.

The theme for this year's NAIDOC Week is - Always Was, Always Will Be. Always Was, Always Will Be recognises that First Nations people have occupied and cared for this continent for over 65,000 years.

Australia has the world's oldest oral stories. The First Peoples engraved the world's first maps, made the earliest paintings of ceremony and invented unique technologies. We built and engineered structures - structures on Earth - predating well-known sites such as the Egyptian Pyramids and Stonehenge.

Our adaptation and intimate knowledge of Country enabled us to endure climate change, catastrophic droughts and rising sea levels. Always Was, Always Will Be acknowledges that hundreds of Nations and our cultures covered this continent. All were managing the land - the biggest estate on earth - to sustainably provide for their future.

NAIDOC 2020 invites all Australians to embrace the true history of this country – a history which dates back thousands of generations. It's about seeing, hearing and learning the First Nations' 65,000+ year history of this country - which is our Australian history. We want all Australians to celebrate that we have the oldest continuing cultures on the planet.

At St Mary MacKillop College, we celebrated our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture in several ways for NAIDOC Week.

Aaron brought along some traditional bush tucker plants which will be planted in our kitchen garden. Students will then have to opportunity to cook and create using these traditional ingredients in the kitchen.

Art Workshops

On Tuesday 10 November, art students at the St Peter's Campus participated in a workshop with acclaimed artist Hubert Pareroultja. Hubert is a senior Western Aranda-Luritja man who lives at Kulpitharra / Lundara outstation west of Hermannsburg (Ntaria) and is an established artist at the Iltja Ntajarra (Many Hands) art centre, which follows the in the traditions of the iconic artist Albert Namatjira. Hubert is the 2020 Wynne Prize for Australian Landscape Art Award winner. Students were guided through a range of water colour techniques to paint an image of a ghost gum on country. Students listened to Hubert's story as he painted and explained how he connects to country when he is painting and the traditions that have been passed down to him by his Uncle, Father and Grandfather. At the end, we were able to ask questions and we were most interested with the layering technique Hubert uses to build up the intensity and depth of colours used in his works. Students on the Padua campus had the opportunity to participate in a similar workshop with artist Vanessa Inkamala on the 24 November. This time they will painted Mt Sonder on Country and investigated this artist's unique painting style and techniques.

Emu Caller Workshops

Padua 'MacKillop Mob' students worked to create an Emu Caller. An Emu Caller is an Aboriginal hunting tool used to attract emus. Tapping one end with the flat of their hand produced an unusual sound that aroused the emu's curiosity and lured it away from the nest so that the Aborigines could safely steal the emu eggs. The Year 7-9 students participated in this day long activity to shape and decorate their own personal Emu Caller. This was an excellent opportunity for our students to have a hands on cultural and creative experience!

Dance Workshops

Our Year 7 Physical Education classes were visited by Fred Reid from the Maluerindi group. Fred has performed nationally and internationally for over 20 years and has passed on his knowledge to his sons to continue his aim of "bridging the gap" between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians. Being a victim of the stolen generation, Fred believes telling his story within the education systems will enable a better understanding of the past injustices of his people. His ability to build positive relationships with students and teachers through his performances and workshops guarantees a rich and exciting experience for all involved. Our students had the opportunity to learn about traditional musical instruments, symbolism in dances and participate in an Aboriginal dance led by Fred.

In Week 5, our Assembly focussed on the celebration of NAIDOC Week. Sadies-Avari Petersen spoke to students about the significance of the theme of NAIDOC week and connection to Country. Hayley Kelly and Billy Perrott read a beautiful prayer about forgiveness and forgiving a pathway forward together. Stewart Barton and Scarlett Kris showed their exceptional music talent with a performance of 'I am Australian'.


Homework Club

Modelling self-kindness



This has been a tough parenting year. On a personal level it's been challenging, but when you add the extra difficulty of helping children and young people navigate this year, you'd be forgiven for feeling like you've had enough.

It's timely to look at US-based academic Dr. Brene' Brown's research that informed her book *The Gift of Imperfect Parenting*. Brown's core finding was that the best parenting strategies rely on modelling for them to be adopted by children. That's a little scary as it means we need to be the adults that we want to our kids to become.

There is great power in kids watching us practise how we manage hardships, frustrations and difficulties. Whether we use self-kindness or self-put downs, either will leave an impression on our kids. Not only do they see how we react when we stumble or make mistakes, but we give them permission to act in the same ways.

It's hard to be self-kind

If you're a goal-oriented type of person, highly-judgemental or someone who likes to get things done, then self-kindness can be difficult to be friend. It goes against the grain to laugh at your mistakes or miss a deadline, even though it won't be the end of the world as you know it. If you recognise this type of rigid approach then it may be time let go of some old ways. Inflexibility is the enemy of healthy wellbeing, which thrives on adaptability and self-forgiveness.

Let them hear the process

Giving a child or young person insight into your thinking is a powerful parenting strategy. Sharing your struggles and mess ups with kids in age-appropriate ways takes vulnerability and promotes empathy. It takes courage to share a comment such as, "I keep putting myself down, which is not helpful. I've got to talk to myself as if I'm talking to someone I love." Disclosing this type of self-talk is only useful if it's done in a safe, matter of fact way and a child is comfortable with the message.

Self-kindness means acting compassionately toward yourself when you are struggling to meet your own expectations, meeting with unexpected difficulties and/or met with failure. It's time to drop the stiff upper lip, put aside the strict schedule and stop berating yourself. Instead say to yourself, "This is really tough right now. How can I take some comfort and look after myself?" This is a message worth modelling particularly, if you are living with a perfectionist or a child with tendencies toward anxiety.
