Student Absences and Late Arrivals

St Mary MacKillop College requires parents to provide a written explanation of their child's absence from school.

If students will be absent from school, parents/carers are requested to notify the College in advance, or on the day of the absence, by contacting the Absentee SMS Line: 0429 131 463



In the event that a student is absent, or late to school, and contact from a parent/carer has not been received, the College will send an SMS message to the first listed parent/carer. Parents/carers are asked to respond to the SMS indicating:

- their child's name
- the date of the absence
- the reason

Receiving this information will allow the College attendance records to be updated, with the explanation of the absence documented. No further action from parent/carers will be required.

If a student arrives late to school, a parent/carer may also physically sign their child in at Student Reception or provide a written note of explanation.



Status Awards

On the Padua Campus, a Status System recognises, affirms and rewards students for positive behaviours. Students may advance to the levels of Bronze, Silver or Gold Status.

Students are issued with a Merit Point Card and encouraged to seek recognition for their positive contributions to the life of MacKillop through aiming for the progressions of Bronze, Silver and Gold Status. School Drop-Off and Pick-Up

Generation Next Meningococcal

Recently, Generation Next posted an article about Meningococcal. This disease can form an adverse lining around the brain and/or sepsis of the blood. The article was quite direct in stating that the key groups most affected by Meningococcal were small children, and adolescents and young adults aged 15-24. The impact of this disease can be quite devastating, with the potential for loss of limbs, deafness and blindness in a minority of cases, and even death in some rare events. Strikingly similar to long COVID, Meningococcal can also linger, with fatigue and ongoing forgetfulness being the result of battling the disease for many people.

There are several variants of Meningococcal, with many now having a vaccine to help protect children and adolescents against the disease. Since 2019, a free, government sponsored program of vaccinations has occurred throughout secondary schools in Australia. This program generally targets Year 10 students and on 31 March at the St Peter's Campus, vaccinations will be conducted. Year 10 students will receive an important form to bring home related to these vaccinations. We ask that this form be returned to your child's Pastoral Care teacher by 9 February.

Some families prefer not to have their children immunised, others elect to get their GP to perform this service in the comfort of their clinics. At MacKillop, we endeavour to provide a safe and private experience for students who choose to obtain this vaccination here at school. Welcome to the 2023 School Year New Opportunities for Success

The beginning of each new school year brings students many new opportunities and the hope to achieve better results, to make new friends, and to try new sports and subjects. There are a number of habits that help students to achieve or bring these new opportunities to fruition.

- 1. Attention and focus attention reflects active engagement with new work, new people and situations. Focus on the desired area for improvement engenders the possibilities for development and growth.
- **2. Goal setting** deliberate thinking about what one wishes to achieve, how they will go about this, and what it will look like, helps to set the direction and creates a commitment to act. Without this commitment, the individual has less to hold them to accountable action.
- **3. Organisation** knowing what has to be done, how it needs to be done and whenit needs to be done is essential in meeting work requirements. Less cognitive load (this is the demand on the working memory; when there is less demand, the brain can respond better) reduces stress and anxiety, which are often present with poor organisation. One of the other positive consequences of organisation is the building of individual confidence.
- **4. Effort is rewarded in achievement** effort is a significant requirement of academic success. One can be talented, but without genuine and sustained effort achievements are less than they can be. **All students have control over the effort they put into their work.**
- **5. Using the resources of the College** the teachers, the Learning Commons, Counsellors and Pastoral Care, homework club, extracurricular activities and other services provide students with advice, support to understand work, and services which are student directed and responsive.

Regular work habits such as study time, revision of daily class notes, exercises and creating study notes encourage the brain to move work from the short term memory to long term memory. This means that the work is then accessible when called upon in assessments. The College recommends that all students spend time each school night completing study, homework and assessment work.

The hours recommendations for each year group per school night are:

Years 7 and 8:	1-1.5 hours per night
Years 9 and 10:	1.5-2 hours per night
Years 11 and 12:	minimum of 3 hours per night

Learning is an active process requiring attention, focus, effort and assistance.

ChatGPT Some Preliminary Comments

One of the most contentious topics being discussed by educators and the broader community right now is "How will Education change in the face of ChatGPT?". In one sense, the day-to-day practice of schools remains the same; students will continue to learn how to research, study, recall and retain knowledge, cite and produce assessment just like they always have. However, ChatGPT certainly presents both opportunities and risks.

ChatGPT is essentially a web-based computer program you can chat or interact with about anything, including asking it to produce any type of written output you request. While that may sound like nothing new, what makes it so powerful is that it has been trained on a Large Language Model that encompasses most of the content that exists on the Internet; you can refine its output through a conversation. So if you needed an essay written on the origins of Pokemon, a poem created about the seasons, a computer program that can play Tic Tac Toe, ChatGPT can easily and quickly generate them for you.

Where there exists some risk, is that the content produced is unique. It isn't 'copied and pasted', it is simply written in response to a request by extraordinary Artificial Intelligence. This may make plagiarism detection a challenge. ChatGPT is also prone to producing spurious content that needs serious vetting and verifying. A student looking to quickly produce a take-home assessment piece could well land themselves in a murky Academic Misconduct situation. Students need to remember that using the work of others and passing it off as their own has not changed, this is still cheating and represents a very serious breach of academic integrity, for which there are commensurate consequences.

Having said that, a tool like this presents incredible opportunities. It allows for individuals to further their own understanding of topics at the pace they need, at a level they feel comfortable with. Its use of Natural Language is incredibly forgiving, and it will converse with individuals at their level. It is a near-perfect tutor!

2023 will be a significant year for both students and teachers to explore the Al space. Finding a way to use its best features and avoid its pitfalls is a new and exciting path we are looking forward to exploring together.
