Opening Mass

St Mary MacKillop College celebrated the start of the 2023 school year with the Opening Mass on Friday 3 March.

Students and staff of the College were joined in Eucharist at the Tuggeranong Basketball Stadium by College Chaplain Fr James Antony, Director of Catholic Education Ross Fox, representatives from several schools, former students, parents, politicians, Board members, and a number of past staff members. We were particularly grateful to have the College's foundation principal, Sr Noelene Quinane, in attendance.

This was MacKillop's first full-school Opening Mass since 2020, with COVID restrictions impacting the event over the past two years.

The Mass introduced the 2023 Liturgical Theme, "See and be grateful" (Mary MacKillop, 1884). This theme calls the community to reflect on and give thanks for MacKillop's history as we celebrate our 25-year anniversary.

As usual, the quality of the music and choir created a special atmosphere and helped transform the basketball stadium into a place of reflection and prayer.

The College thanks its new Assistant Principal for Faith, Mission and Religious Education, Mrs Clare Kinnane, for her leadership and organisation of the event. Congratulations also to the large team who created such a deeply moving community celebration of Eucharist and congratulations to the students for the solemnity and willing participation they brought to the occasion.

The carnival was an enjoyable event for all involved, thanks mainly to the organisational skills of Mrs Romina Schofield and her team of staff and students. Relay for Life

On Saturday 1 April the Year 12 cohort will take part in the Cancer Council's 2023 Relay for Life. Relay for Life is an event that brings communities together to support cancer survivors as well as people who suffer with cancer both short and long term. Relay for Life allows us to remember loved ones who have been lost as well as those who have fought and are fighting a battle against cancer. Five thousand dollars can help fund groundbreaking research into new and better ways to prevent, diagnose and treat cancer. Every cent is crucial to the research, support, and prevention of cancer.

As a school we are participating in Relay for Life to support not just our immediate community at MacKillop but our wider community across Canberra and the country. We Relay for the loved ones that have been lost to cancer. We Relay for the survivors of cancer. We Relay for those who have beat cancer. We Relay to make a difference! Between 7am till 7pm on Saturday 1 April we will be walking, jogging, running, relaying our way around the St Peter's Campus oval. There will be a variety of student performances, live music and entertainment by our cohort. Throughout the day a team baton will remain active across the 12-hour day.

St Joseph

"We see in St Joseph a perfect mirror of confidence in God - a wonderful, unbounded confidence in our good God." Mary MacKillop publicly declared her intention to serve God as a religious sister on 19 March 1866, the Feast of St Joseph.

This year in our Archdiocese we are encouraged to be part of the 'Year of Walking Together'. The Sisters of St Joseph point out that through the Gospel stories we see many examples where the Holy Family made a trip together – Bethlehem, Egypt and Nazareth. Throughout each of these journeys both Mary and her faithful husband Joseph were thrown together to face the contrasting emotions of uncertainty and awe – when faced with visits from Kings and an inn-keeper with no rooms.

In this, our 25th Year, may we as a school community, in the Josephite tradition, look up to the saint that St Mary MacKillop chose to be the patron of the order of religious nuns that she founded. St Joseph was a saint who knew how to listen, talk, discern, decide and act, 'In doing so, he widened the space of his tent, engaged in the mission entrusted to him and lived in the spirit of communion with all those he encountered along the journey. Struggles were part of his reality, yet he remained faithful 'to walking humbly with God' (Micah 6:8) in and through it all.' Sr. Monica Cavanagh, SOSJ Congregational Leader, March 2023.



As a celebration of the Feast of St Joseph, there will be a statue of sleeping St Joseph installed on each campus, blessed by our College Chaplain, Fr James.

The significance and prayer that accompanies these statues is outlined below:

Significance

"I really like St Joseph because he is a man of strength and silence. In my office, I have an image of a sleeping St Joseph, and while he sleeps he takes care of the church. When I have a problem or am faced with a difficulty, I will write it on a piece of paper and I will place it underneath St Joseph, so that he may dream on it. That means: for him to pray for that problem." Pope Francis, January 2015.

"In every difficulty apply to Joseph with confidence, and you will never be disappointed".

STEM News

year 8

This year in Year 8 we are trialling the ACARA Digital Technologies curriculum version 9. This semester, students will be learning about data, computer languages, networks, algorithms, privacy, and cyber security.

year 9

Year 9 students are studying Photovoltaics this semester. They are gaining an understanding of solar energy, photovoltaics, and solar cells and applying their knowledge to the design of homes and locations of solar panels for efficient energy generation.



At the Padua campus next term, we are starting a new initiative, an Exploring Robotics Club, where students will learn to operate and build robots. The club will run on Monday afternoons. Notes are now available on Canvas in the student information section.

year 10

Year 10 Students have been designing their own projects in STEM. In the latter half of the semester they will get to realise, test and evaluate their projects. Students also had the opportunity to visit KPMG in week 4 here is a brief account of the visit.

On Friday 24 February, we went to KPMG to participate in a STEM event presented by Engineers Australia. The experience provided us with a unique opportunity to learn about the field of engineering and its various applications. During the event, we were introduced to the benefits of becoming an engineer, as well as what it's like to have a career in engineering. The highlight of the day was the fun design challenges that we participated in. One challenge involved brainstorming as many solutions as possible, with no limitations, for a new ride design at Dreamworld that would make the user feel like they were flying. Another challenge required us to build a bungee jumping platform using spaghetti, string, and tape that could hold a marshmallow on top. It was a great experience that not only challenged our problem-solving skills but also enlightened us about the possibilities that a career in engineering can offer.

Year 10 Crime and Politics

In week 6, the Year 10 Crime and Politics classes went on an excursion to both old and new Parliament House. Whilst at Parliament House, we had the opportunity to speak to our local government member David Smith, who talked to us about some initiatives the government is currently implementing in Canberra. We also had the opportunity to ask him questions and he gave us some good suggestions for our assignments, that we were currently working on! It was really interesting to compare the two houses of government and understand how politics has changed over the years. We had a chance to look at the history of politics which helped us to recognise current political issues and the development of policy. This excursion was relevant to what we are currently learning about in Crime and Politics and was a great experience!



Year 11 Data Project

Since the start of 2022, Mr Tristan Burg has been working in the role of Data Project Officer. This role was established to investigate how the College could use the sources of data available across the College to better inform the teaching and learning process. The two-year project had a scope to: explore, compile and analyse sets of data; pilot the use of specific data metrics to support curriculum and pastoral leaders; develop efficient systems of data presentation to support staff in their decision making; and to develop systems of data presentation to inform students and parents about student progress.

As part of this process, working with Mr Matthew Crowe and Mrs Jane Cunneen, a pilot program for data-informed pastoral conversations was developed for 2023 Year 11 Pastoral Care teachers. For each student in Year 11, a data sheet was developed which tracked their performance in each Semester of enrolment in key areas related to attendance, approaches to learning and academic performance. Pastoral Care teachers were trained in the use of these sheets and these were used to enrich the Pastoral conversation with students by: affirming their successes; highlighting areas for development; guiding their 2023 academic ambitions goal-setting; and making connections between performance, study habits, and the support services offered for Senior student studies at MacKillop.

In the coming weeks valuable feedback will be gathered form Year 11 Pastoral Care teachers and Year 11 students, so we can refine and embed this data-informed practice at MacKillop. Later in the year we intend on inviting the parent community to an information night to explore MacKillop's broader use of data to inform teaching and learning.

Queensland inquiry to examine proliferation of vaping

In an interesting article on the <u>ABC recently</u>, some details of a Queensland state government inquiry into vaping were outlined. As many of us are aware, vaping has grown in popularity in a short space of time. Some data from an Australian National University study indicated that one-third of e-cigarette users were under 25, and half were under 30. The same study found that one in ten people over the age of 14 had tried a vape (<u>Australia has a vaping problem, but no easy health or political solution - ABC News</u>). This would show the critical time to inform, educate and shape young people's attitudes towards harmful practices like vaping is now in their formative years.

The scope of the Queensland inquiry will be noteworthy. It will consider how widely available vapes are and why that is the case. In addition, the inquiry will examine the contents of the liquid in vapes and the potential harmful effects of vaping those chemicals. The ACT Legislative Assembly recently passed legislation (The Health Legislation Amendment Bill, 11/2022) that sought to enhance the laws related to vapes in the following ways:

- Prohibiting the sale of e-cigarettes from vending machines; and,
- Enforcing stronger compliance from businesses to not sell vapes to people aged under 18
- Ensuring nicotine vapes were only available under prescription (ACT vaping laws are changing | Canberra CityNews)

The more information that is publicly available in this regard the better it will be for parents and carers, and teachers, to have important conversations with young people regarding vapes and vaping. In addition, the stronger and more effective regulatory systems are to control the prevalence of vapes, the better chance we as parents/carers and teachers have of steering the young people in our care in healthy directions.

Brodie Maguire (Year 12) has been selected to compete in the ACT Women's Touch team.


Brianna Hosie (Year 12) has been selected to compete in the NSW Women's Baseball team.

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Learning to take on challenges

Challenges are the pathway to growth. When our children habitually avoid challenges, their learning stalls. When they learn to understand, value, and embrace challenge, their learning accelerates. So, helping our children develop a healthy relationship with challenge becomes one of the most important ways we can help them become better learners.

How does your child respond to a challenge?

Does your child avoid a challenge, seeking their "path of least resistance" in learning?

Or do they select the challenges they know they can do? Looking like they are working hard, but secretly avoiding mistakes by not taking on anything too challenging?

Maybe your child takes on challenges because the teacher tells them to. They follow the teacher's instructions and are led through challenging tasks.

Perhaps your child takes on challenges because they need to. They have something they want to achieve, a goal in mind. Their relationship with challenge is born out of necessity so they can reach their goal.

But imagine if your child embraced challenges. In the spirt of John F. Kennedy when he said, "we do these things, not because they are easy, but because they are hard!" Imagine if when they were given the choice of doing something hard, or something easy, they'd choose the more challenging task, because they understood that challenge is the pathway to growth.

Becoming a Skilful Learner

How our children respond to challenges is a key element of what I call Learnership™ – the skill of learning. Learnership is a skill developed over time. It helps our children (and us) to get more out of every learning opportunity. Most importantly, Learnership is something we can teach our children that helps them to thrive both in school and life.

As parents we can help our children on the path to becoming better learners, by helping them develop a healthier and more productive relationship with challenge.

Comfort Zone V's Learning Zone. What's the Difference?

The first step in helping your child develop a healthy relationship with challenge is to teach them the difference between their Comfort Zone and their Learning Zone.

We've all heard that we need to get outside our comfort zone and challenge ourselves, but how many of our children truly understand what that means?

For many people, getting outside their comfort zone means trying something new. But something new, isn't always something challenging. Very often "new" is simply an "easy thing we haven't done yet". There is little struggle involved in this type of challenge, it comes with a great deal of certainty, and confidence that we'll succeed. These challenges feel more like a task. They keep us busy, but they don't help us get better. These types of challenges are in our Comfort Zone.

To be truly challenged our children need to stretch themselves beyond their current abilities. These types of challenge feel like a problem. Unlike a task where the path to completion is easily recognised, the solution to this challenge is not immediately apparent. They leave us feeling uncertain, and they involve struggle. The challenge feels "hard". When our child feels like this, it's a good sign they are in their Learning Zone.

Being in your Learning Zone feels uncomfortable. When our children find themselves in the Learning Zone, their first reaction is often to get out of it. Suddenly anything else seems like a more attractive option. They look for distractions, seek out easy options or adopt any number of avoidance strategies.

Struggle is temporary

It's important to help our children recognise that the feeling of struggle and discomfort that comes with being in their Learning Zone is temporary. It passes. Many children believe if they are struggling now, then the next step in learning will involve even more struggle. They believe that the further they go, the more uncomfortable they'll feel. So naturally, they turn away from further struggle.

The reality is that effort is the currency of growth, and struggle is the price we pay for that growth. The reward is that what we experienced as hard today, becomes easy tomorrow. It doesn't get harder and harder and harder. It's hard, then it's easy. Then they move on, and the next step is also hard, until they make that easy. Being in the Learning Zone, and experiencing the struggle that comes with it, is not only a normal part of learning, but also an essential part of growth.

Parenting for more skilful learners

As parents we have an important role in helping our children become more skilful learners. This begins by helping them develop a healthy relationship with challenge. By teaching them that effort is the cost of growth, and normalising the struggle that comes from being in their Learning Zone, we help them become "comfortably uncomfortable" with challenge, and put them on a path of continuous growth.
