Luna Park Excursion

On Friday 31 March, Year 11 and 12 Physics students travelled to Luna Park wearing data loggers to measure the forces experienced on the various rides. Here are some student reflections and memories of the day:

- The day was really fun and it was great to hang out with friends while also putting in some practical work. Going on all the rides was an amazing experience and it was really interesting to investigate the physics behind the movements that make the rides so enjoyable.
- The tango train was a really good way to experience inertia while being pushed onto the passenger on the outside of the cart, squishing them into the wall until the ride slowed and the inertia was decreased.
- Luna Park's "Sledgehammer" was a treat to ride on. While some were not up to the challenge of taking on the ride those who dared to give it a shot were rewarded by getting thrown upside down over and over while being spun around, then feeling large g-forces as we sped through the bottom of the loop.



Sandon Point - Rock Platform Fieldwork

On Monday 3 April, Year 11 and 12 Biology, Earth Science and Interdisciplinary Science students participated in fieldwork on the rock platforms at Sandon Point, Bulli NSW. Students experienced a variety of activities, including exploring the adaptations of the marine organisms and using a range of equipment to collect accurate data on the conditions on the day, including air temperature to wind speed to the salinity of the water.

It was beautiful at Sandon Point, and despite some wet feet from accidental steps into the rock pools, students had a fantastic time applying population measurement techniques learnt in class to the real world. They relished the opportunity to explore a new ecosystem and observe a wide variety of marine creatures in their natural habitat, including limpets, crabs, waratah anemones and sea slugs.





Geography Trip to Kosciuszko National Park

On Monday 27 March, Geography students in Years 10, 11 and 12 travelled to Kosciuszko National Park. Multiple rangers from NSW National Parks & Wildlife Service were on hand to greet and guide the students through a range of fieldwork activities throughout the day. Year 10 students recorded observations from multiple locations across Kosciuszko National Park and examined the features of the vegetation zones found within the Park. Despite the cold temperatures and rain, Year 11 and 12 students walked along Charlotte Pass looking at the natural environmental hazards, such as invasive species, that are present in this alpine environment. In the afternoon, both groups examined the impact that human activity has had on the natural environment at Perisher Resort, as well as some of the management strategies that have been put in place to mitigate these impacts.

While many challenges still exist in the preservation of the Kosciuszko National Park, it was clear that students realised the sizeable impact that humans have had on the degradation of the alpine area and are now aware of the active role that they can play in preserving this unique Australian landscape.

Year 8 Science - Geodes

Students have been learning about minerals and mining, with recent lessons focusing on geodes. Geodes are hollow, somewhat spherical, rocks which contain deposits of minerals and/or crystals on their inner surface. They are found all over the world, but commonly in Mexico, Australia, Brazil, Uruguay, Namibia and the USA. From the outside they appear as typical grey-brown rocks, but once cut or broken open the crystals within can be revealed. Over the last two weeks all Year 8 students broke open geodes to observe the minerals crystals that have formed inside.



Languages

Commedia Dell'Arte

Year 7, 8, 9 and 10 Italian students were visited by a Commedia Dell'Arte performance group earlier in Term 1. Students were able to be immersed in a traditional Italian play that included Italian vocabulary. This experience was not only informative but also highly entertaining.

French and Italian

The Languages Faculty has been busy introducing new language programs and events to enhance the language learning experience for students at MacKillop.

This year, there are two more languages for Year 7 to choose from with the return of French and the introduction of Latin. Students starting at MacKillop from Year 7 now have four language choices available to them. This is beneficial for our students as when they have more language options, they are able to choose the language that interests them the most, making the learning process more enjoyable and engaging.

From learning about space and tempo, to adding gesture and expression to precise movements, we were able to understand the possibilities of a single movement within a scene, and how impactful that movement can be. He discussed his experiences in travelling to Trinidad and Tobago to represent Australia – the annual event brings young leaders around the world together in a mock Westminster system style event. Winter Uniform

From the beginning of Term 2, all students are to be wearing the Winter Uniform.

- For students choosing to wear the male uniform this means that tailored mid-grey school trousers are to be worn with a black belt and junior (7-10) or senior (11-12) school tie.
- For students choosing to wear the female uniform they may wear the pleated tartan winter skirt or tailored navy slacks with a College monogram, a white over-blouse with a College monogram, and a teal kerchief. Opaque navy tights are optional.
- The College teal jumper and/or navy College jacket with College crest should be worn to keep warm
- School shoes are to be traditional, lace-up, black and polishable

The below information is taken from the College Uniform policy and is accessible in the Student Diary and on the <u>College Website</u>. It is provided to assist parents/carers in ensuring that students return to school for Term 2 compliant with the uniform.

- · Girls' skirts, dresses or shorts are to be knee length.
- Hair should be clean and neat; fashionable extremes are not permitted ... Only natural, all-over hair colour or subtle highlights can be used to dye or highlight hair. Rats tails, horsey, dreadlocks and geometric shapes cut into the hair, and extreme variations of length are not permitted.
- Nose, tongue and facial studs/rings, body piercing ornaments or plastic plugs are not permitted. Clear piercings are also not permitted.

Students have been reminded that any holiday 'variations' such as facial piercings or fashionable extremes to hair such as colours or styles should be rectified before returning to school for the new term.

If there are circumstances that prevent students from wearing the correct uniform, they are required to bring a signed note from their parents to explain the situation. This needs to be presented to the Pastoral Care Coordinator during PC time each morning to obtain a uniform pass.

The College focuses on restoring the relationship between members of our community by providing students with an experience where they understand that with poor decisions come consequences and an opportunity to learn from those decisions.

My child is a bully

No parent wants to hear that their child is a bully. It's awful to think that your child maybe inflicting harm on someone.

If you hear that your child is being a bully, resist the temptation to panic or be defensive. Stay composed and begin to gather the facts. These tips will help:

Communicate

Let your child know that you have heard that they are bullying and that you are concerned about this. Let them know that you are worried about them and want to help. This may take many attempts as your child may feel embarrassed, or unhappy that they've been caught. Remain calm and direct and ensure your child that you want to hear their side of the story. Talking through with your child about their situation can help you understand why the aggression is occurring and help you work out what to do about it.

Some children due to their age or mental health may not be able to articulate their thoughts. Consider a visit to as health professional for further assistance.

Look ahead

Once you've gained an understanding of the causes of the bullying look ahead and work through with your child how they may act in future situations. Help them understand how their behaviour may have impacted on the other child, and what it would be like if they received that behaviour.

Reflect

Children often copy the behaviours they experience so take the time to reflect on the relationship skills that your child may be witnessing at home. If family members yell, hit or put each other down then look for ways to foster a positive family culture based on kindness, respect and empathy.

Use consequences

Consequences for bullying can be useful if they are related to the behaviour and reasonable in nature. For instance, it's reasonable for a teenager involved in cyber-bullying behaviour to lose their Internet access and phone use privileges as they've failed to stick to the expectations laid down about responsible use. The length of time for loss of privileges depends on the severity of the issue and your child's attitude. As a rule of thumb lengthy loss of privileges can be ineffective as kids cease to care when they're too long.

Restore relationships

'How will you fix this?' is something a child who bullies needs to hear. Discuss with your child how they will make some restitution to the child or young person they've hurt, whether it's through a written apology, playing a game with a child who they've excluded or apologising to a child whom they humiliated in front of their peers.

Monitor the situation

Your child's bullying may be a one-off event, however stay mindful or your child's behaviour, their state of mind and the way they continue to relate to others. Let your child know that you want to help them be happy, to enjoy positive friendships and relate well to others.

Bullying is an emotive term that leaves most of us shaken when we hear it. It helps to think of bullying as a being a behaviour resulting from poor decision-making or poor communication skills rather than as a reflection on your child. The latter is hard to change, however the former is always up for change and improvement.
