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PRINCIPAL'S LETTER

Dear families, students and friends,

Parent satisfaction survey and strategic planning

Thank you to the 380 families who were able to respond to the very lengthy survey that closed last Monday. A wide variety of questions were asked and the results of the survey have been shown to the College Board and to the Executive. I will take the staff through many of the responses at a General Staff Meeting later this term. The issues that will be focused on at the staff meeting will be parent attitudes towards student safety and wellbeing, reporting and communication, student satisfaction with classes, elective choices, co and extra-curricular activities, and the Catholic foundation of the school.

Generally, parent satisfaction with all aspects of the school is stratospherically high and overwhelmingly constructive and positive. This is deeply affirming for the MacKillop community and points to an underlying reason why the College is held in such high regard around the city. Readers are able to explore selected responses at: http://www.mackillop.act.edu.au/images/publications/PSSP2015.pdf. A small selection of responses may be of interest at this stage, however:

- I approve of the aim of the College to be a Catholic school for all: 87% agreed or strongly agreed with nearly 10% neutral.
- Teachers at MacKillop are committed to quality teaching: 86% agreed or strongly agreed with nearly 11% neutral.
- My child gets every chance to achieve their best at MacKillop: 74% agreed or strongly agreed, with 15% neutral.
- My child generally enjoys going to class at MacKillop: 85% agreed or strongly agreed, with 8% neutral.
- My child feels safe at school: 87% agree or strongly agreed, with 9% neutral.
- Generally there is a very positive relationship between my child and the teachers: 85% agreed or strongly agreed, with 11% neutral.

Two areas of interest to readers: 85% of respondents would like to be better informed of their child's progress, and 68% would like the feedback to students and parents about their child's performance, in particular assessment tasks, to be more meaningful.

The College has undertaken a task-by-task review of all individual assessment tasks, called the Assessment Review Committee, which has led to greater clarity, streamlining, and structure across faculties for assessment tasks. The staff are also working towards clearer outcome-based advice on assessment tasks to better inform student achievement and to give students a more structured opportunity to approach improvement.

In general, there was a lot of constructive advice for the College to incorporate into our planning and a clear emphasis from many respondents that the College's emphasis should continue to be co-educational, Catholic, welcoming of all, with a clear emphasis on quality teaching and learning, providing prompt and clear advice to parents, and a place of safety and wellbeing as adolescents move from being young children to 18 year olds preparing for life beyond school. From my point of view, and I hope from yours, this has been a most constructive exercise and should lead to improvements in including parents in their children's education and in building further confidence in the leadership of the College around our core business. Student satisfaction surveys will be completed later in the term.

NAPLAN

Recently, the 2015 NAPLAN data was released by ACARA, and families will have received a hard copy of their children's results. While the full analysis of the school data takes place over many weeks and becomes a reference point for teaching and learning across the school, some initial analysis has been completed. This analysis shows some areas of success and some areas which will become the focus of teaching and learning practices in the coming year.

Successes for MacKIllop this year has been in Numeracy and in Writing. School Growth (which indicates the value added by the school) is strong and almost exclusively above the territory mean, and there has been strong Student Growth in Writing and Numeracy. While traditionally Mackillop has shown strength in the middle bands of achievement, this year's data reveals improvement towards the upper bands in most domains. This year's focus on raising expectations among students is well timed, aimed as it is at moving students who are comfortably achieving into the higher bands by challenging them, and we are starting to see the success of our interventions in literacy and numeracy in Years 7 - 9. Areas for more growth for MacKillop are in Reading, where we are already implementing shared teaching strategies and professional learning for teachers to create a whole school focus on improvement.

Maths Projects at Wanniassa

Maths teachers are quite familiar with the 'when are we ever going to use this?' question from students. To maintain and enhance student engagement, teachers are constantly on the lookout for ways to promote relevancy of our subject for the teenage mindset.

In order to demonstrate the far-reaching uses of mathematics in the 'real world', three classes on the Wanniassa Campus have embarked upon a statistical project. Students working in teams of 2 - 3 are creating an informative poster presentation based on the collection and interpretation of data, addressing a practical research question of their team's choosing. These posters will then be entered into the National Secondary Schools Poster Competition, organised by the Statistical Society of Australia. This project has evolved as part of the International Statistical Literacy Project and serves as a preliminary round for teams wishing to enter the International Competition.

Building upon study already undertaken in the area of data analysis in Semester 1, these two Year 9 classes and one Year 8 class are well placed to extend their curriculum-based learning with an enriching student-centred application. To excite student imagination and introduce the various real-world applications of statistics, Dr Rachel Barker from the Australian Bureau of Statistics has been working in partnership with St Mary MacKillop College, assisting students with formulating their research questions and collecting and analysing their data in class. Some examples of team projects include: correlating AFL individual disposal rate and Brownlow Medal recipients; determining whether listening to pop music enhances mental mathematics ability; researching what era has the most quickly recognisable music and comparing the taste of different water types and some reasons for differing preferences.

Students are already well on their way to completing their projects. We can't wait to see the finished products, and how they will fare in the competition.

The presentation will cover topics such as how young people are using technology to have fun, online grooming, cyber-bullying, inappropriate content and e-security.


This is a fantastic opportunity for you to learn more about how young people have fun online, how you can help them to stay in control on the net, and how to report a problem.

Building parent-school partnerships

How do you maintain a good relationship with a teenager? Here are two simple strategies to help parents hit the right parenting mark through this sometimes-challenging stage.

One of the biggest challenges parents of teenagers face is how to maintain a good relationship with a young person while managing also their sometimes tricky and anti-social behaviour. The balance between good guy and bad guy is precarious indeed.

There are two simple strategies, when used in tandem, can really help parents straddle this great divide. They are - following through and following up.

When used wisely and consistently they can help parents manage teenagers even during their more difficult stages while maintaining a respectful relationship.

Following through to teach responsibility

'Following through' means doing what you say you'll do. If you say "You're grounded" yet then let a young person off the hook when they came home from an outing later than agreed, you are merely issuing a meaningless threat. Most young people know a meaningless threat when they hear one.

'Following through' is about taking parent action and the most appropriate action is the use of behavioural consequences. When young people behave poorly, irresponsibly, transgress family rules or someone's

individual rights, then the experience of a negative consequence teaches them that there is a link between their behaviour and outcomes. If this sounds high-handed then relax. It's how a civil society operates. Drive too fast and you'll receive a fine. Harm someone and hopefully you'll be issued with a suitable punishment that matches the offence. 'Cross a line and something happens' is the accepted wisdom in our community, in school and in family-life.

It's important that the consequence issued matches the misdemeanour. When we go too far – "you're grounded for the term" – then we generally get resentment. Not strong enough – "you should apologise" and they become ineffective. It also helps when consequences are related to the misdemeanour. Taking away a teenager's regular pocket money to remind him to come home on time defies teenage logic and will generally lead to resentment. Be mindful that a rational, logical approach is a parent's best defence against teen emotion.

The key to the successful use of consequences rests with how you implement them. If you issue them in anger (even though that's how you feel) then you are inviting a young person to challenge you. Implement consequences dispassionately

and calmly and you'll increase the likelihood of them being mad at themselves rather than mad at you. Nonchalance is a parent's best friend when it comes to managing the behaviour of highly-charged teens.

Following up to reconnect

It's easy to lock a young person out emotionally following a behaviour meltdown or disagreement, particularly when they've said or done hurtful things. Once the dust has settled after discipline or a dispute then it's time to follow-up with a kind word, an enjoyable activity or even just a sincere smile. It generally takes the adult in the relationship – parents or teachers – to make the first move to put the relationship back on an even keel. It's smart to choose a time when you are both more relaxed to reconnect rather than rush to make up before either person is ready, which can make matters worse.

Following through and following up are a dynamic discipline duo when they are used together as they help parents straddle the good guy, bad guy line that seems to appear on almost a daily basis. Use one without the either and you'll come across as either too soft or too harsh. Use them in tandem and you're more than likely hit the right parenting mark.
