

IS DIFFICULT TO ACCEPT that it is now over 20 years since the College began as a two campus, Catholic secondary school called MacKillop Catholic College. Under the leadership of Sister of St Joseph Noelene Quinane, the College opened its doors with a motto of "Faith and Courage" and a Vision statement that emboldened the College to be a "dynamic and welcoming community."

Sr Noelene is still in touch with some staff and me; previous principals Moira Najdecki and Rita Daniels also keep in touch and indeed were present at the opening of the new buildings earlier this year. A few staff remain, early plantings have grown – giving colour in autumn and shade in summer – and extensive refurbishments and buildings have enhanced the teaching and community facilities of the school.

Visitors to MacKillop this year have commented favourably upon the physical changes to the school. They have also warmly commented upon the sustained energy and spirit of the school and the celebration of diversity and inclusion that was present at the very start of the life of the College.

The celebrations have been restrained with a staff reunion, opening new buildings, highlighting 'Providence' and the life of Fr Julian Tenison-Woods, and a Mass of thanksgiving. A real feature of the year has been the visits of so many Sisters of St Joseph who were so praiseworthy of the kindness of the students and the dignity of our liturgies.

If a Catholic school is to be able to contribute meaningfully to the Catholic community, it must be a place that proclaims the Gospel and that is faithful to the teachings of the Church Christ gave us. It must be a source of pride and confidence to its community and be a place that invites its members, particularly its students and staff, to know and love Jesus.

If it is to be a place that contributes to the wider community, a Catholic school must be authentically Catholic, it must aspire to provide equity of access, be committed to inclusion and diversity, and be engaged with that wider community. Its key means to achieve this is by providing a quality education for its students and to invest in the professional growth of its teachers.

As MacKillop embraces its future, it finds itself in a strong position to be faithful to its Vision. The challenges of funding, religious freedom, and the need to provide excellence will be met with faith, courage, hope, and a clear sense of our core business.

I would like to thank the College Board, College Leadership, the staff, student leaders, students, and their parents/carers for their support of the College this year. Confident in our Vision and ambitious for our students, 2019 and beyond will be embraced with an undeterred spirit.

Other interesting facts

- 1. Mrs O'Donnell was the College's first Year 12 Coordinator.
- 2. In 1998, Year 7 was based at the Padua Campus and Year 8 was at the St Peter's Campus. It wasn't until the year 2000 that students were split into Years 7-9 at Padua/Wanniassa and Years 10-12 at St Peter's/Isabella.
- 3. The school has now existed longer as MacKillop (21 school years at the end of 2018) than it did as Padua High School (20 years).
- The College celebrated five years as a College at MacKillop Day in 2002 - this was during the fifth year. The 10-year celebrations were held in the College's 11th year and the 20-year celebrations were held in the 21st year.
- 5. No student has won more Year 12 Perpetual Awards than **Jon Lovell**, who was also MacKillop's first College Captain. He won four Perpetual Awards.
- 6. The longest-serving staff member was **Mrs Maria Philpot**, who worked at Padua and MacKillop for 34 years. Mrs Colleen Kain (30 years) has worked at MacKillop the longest among still-active staff members.
