THE SPRING ZING

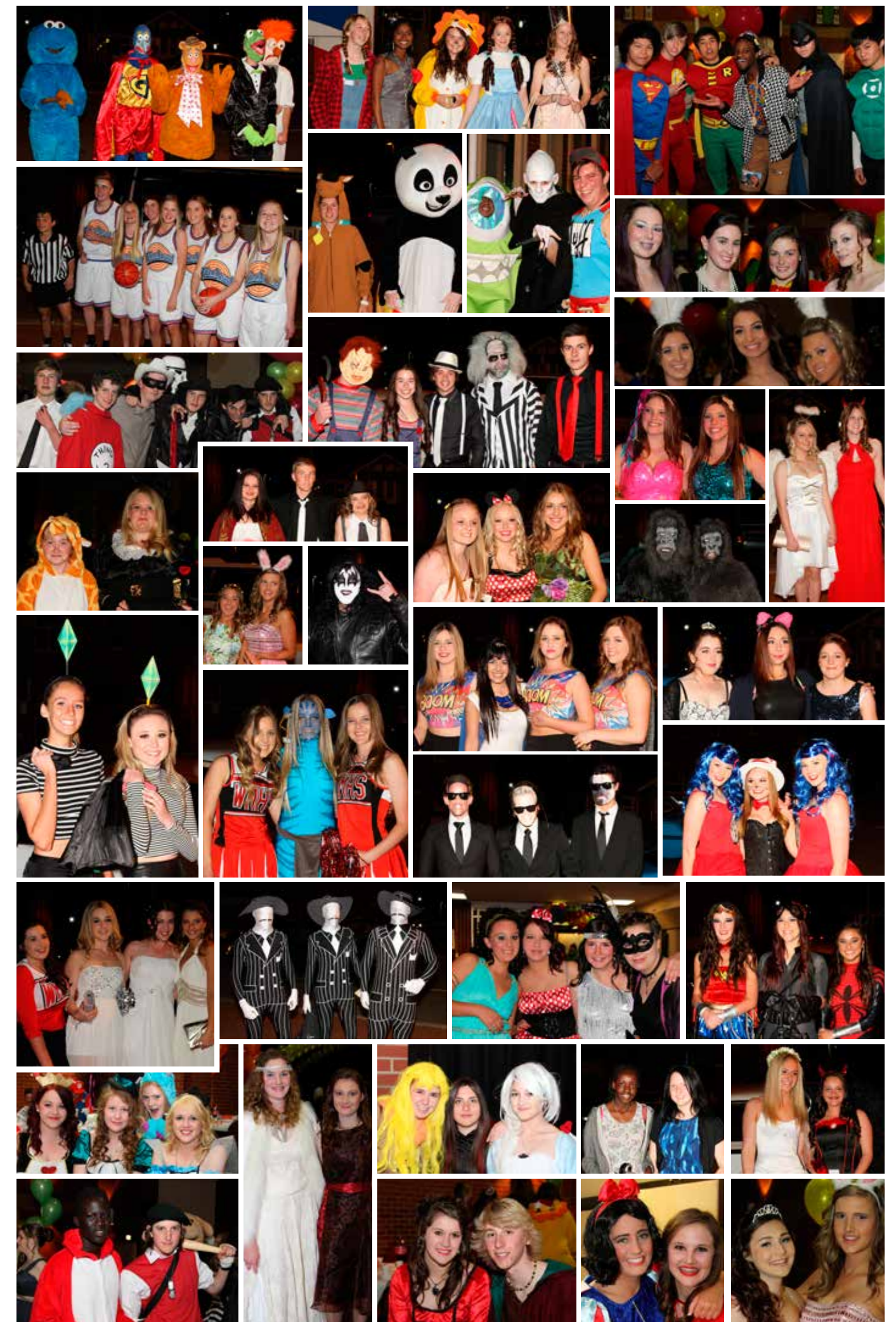

COORDINATORS' LETTER

THE YEAR HAS DRAWN to a close and it was pleasing to see the Year 11 students develop as senior students. They began school enthusiastically and with an eagerness to see what the year had in store for them. The first term ended fairly quickly and some students wondered where the beginning of the year had gone.

The second term saw the Year 11 students attend a successful retreat where they forged stronger ties as a group and formed new relationships. The physical activities proved to be a little strenuous for some but all attempted and were happier for the experience. The unpleasant long queues for food were fortunately overshadowed by some of the interesting activities available, such as rock climbing, archery, bike riding and circus ticks to name a few. I would like to thank Mr Lee for delivering an excellent motivational presentation during the evening. Students commented on the quality of this presentation and that they had learned a lot about resilience and relationships. I would also like to thank Mrs White for her preparation of the Mass. This was an opportunity for all students to slow down and reflect on their spiritual lives. The pastoral leaders were instrumental in allowing this event to happen and I would like to thank them for their time and other contributions they made to ensure a successful experience for our students. Finally I would like to thank our students who willingly participated in all activities and exhibited a high standard of courteous behaviour towards the staff at the Jindabyne Sports and Recreation Centre.

The Pastoral Program this year focused on relationships, resilience and leadership in community service. Students participated in year group activities and Pastoral Class activities. The themes of the pastoral program were designed to develop students into strong, resilient people so that the challenges in their lives could be met with greater success. We had the Federal Police speak to students about cyber bullying and other social network pitfalls that they should be aware of and recognise that some actions on these social network sites could be deemed illegal if they are seen to harm or harass other people. The 'Menslink' representatives spoke with the boys to ensure that they were not alone in having to face some unpleasant issues; that it's OK for men to speak about some of the difficulties they may face from time to time. The girls had a similar presentation on the day that was orientated towards females.

Later in the year, the Year 11 students started to look towards Year 12 and the potential to be leaders in the school, and to apply for specific leadership roles as school captains and house leaders. The pastoral program focused on leadership and what this meant in a Catholic School. The interactive presentation on leadership for the whole group developed an awareness of the possible nature of leadership in a Christian school, one modelled on the teachings of Jesus and Gospel Values.
